Marker replaced

Oct. 5, 1986, the vandalized grave marker of Nicholas Wolf of Michigan Bluff, who died of a heart attack on Jan. 5, 1888, while deer hunting on Mosquito Ridge, Placer County, was replaced by members of the Placer Preservation Corps.

When Nick Wolf did not return from his hunting trek, his friends went looking for him. They found his dead body near the Mosquito Ridge Trail, close to the buck he had ap-parently killed. His friends buried his body where be lay and later erected a somewhat crude marker over the grave.
